G&T NEWS: Mrs. Morris

Kindergarten classes heard the story, <u>The Biggest Pumpkin Ever</u>, by Steven Kroll. Students then designed and built pumpkin transporters using legos! First graders enjoyed the book, Room on a Broom, by Julia Donaldson. Next, they participated in a STEM project called balance the broom. We created levers using pencils and rulers to balance cups that represented the characters from the book. The Second graders have been working on an architecture unit. We read, Iggy Peck, Architect, by Andrea Beatty and built sticky structures. Students then designed and built 2 and 3 dimensional shapes using toothpicks and modeling clay. The Third Grade students are working on a twist of the classic fairy tale, Little Red Riding Hood. In this twist, the students learned about Morse Code and will design and create two instruments. The two distinct sounds will represent the "Dot and Dash" of Morse Code. Students will use these instruments to warn Little Red Riding Hood of the Wolf's dastardly plans! G & T fourth graders have been studying simple machines. They are now designing and building Pumpkin Pulley systems. Fifth grade G&T students continue their CSI unit called, Who Stole the Chocolate. So far the students have completed forensic labs on fingerprinting and dusting for footprints. Finally, the Sixth grade G&T students have been researching different types of renewable energy. They are also working in groups to build solar and wind powered devices using K'NEX.

The school year is in full swing in the Resource Rooms as the students are working hard toward achieving new goals. The first grade math students are learning adding and subtracting up to the number 20 with and without a ten-frame. The students in third and fourth grades are using patterns to solve multiplication facts for 0, 1, 2, 5, 9, and 10. The fifth graders are adding and subtracting decimals by using play money to buy items and calculate change. It's "Everything's Fractions" for the sixth graders as they are working on adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing! In ELA, first, third, and fourth graders are writing their, "All About Me" narratives and forming nightly reading routines. The sixth graders are learning about context clues.
