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#### **ELA NEWS: Mrs. Gerard**

#### **MATH NEWS: Mr. Morris**

The sixth grade students are just wrapping up learning about statistical questions, box plots, and M.A.D. (Means Absolute Deviation). Statistical Questions are questions that have more than one answer as opposed to a non-statistical question that has a definite answer. For example, the question how old are the students who attend Grant School would be a statistical question because the ages vary. Box plots and M.A.D. are multi-layers equations that require several steps to complete and once the answers are solved can be displayed in graphs and tables. The students are beginning to understand that 6th grade math requires many steps to complete and reaching the final answer sometimes takes a little time and patience.
