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

Third Grade: Ms. Leon

Spring has Sprung! Our students are blooming with creativity and ideas this season. We are currently exploring genres such as folktales and fables, learning about stories and myths that have been passed down through generations. One of our favorites is, "Martina the Beautiful Cockroach: A Cuban Folktale." In this folktale, Martina must find a suitable suitor but first she must listen to her grandmother's advice to spill coffee on their shoes first! We learned a good way to judge a person's character is to see how he or she acts when angry. Actions are what matter, not appearances. Respect your elders-you can learn from them! For writing, we wrapped up our Informational Report and are excited to show you very soon. The posters will be hung on our bulletin board and posted on ClassDojo. We will be begin Argumentative writing and our students are excited to show you what they stand for! In math, we have been experimenting with milliliters and liters, kilograms and grams to measure liquid volume and solid mass. We continue to practice our multiplication facts and addition/subtraction skills using different strategies. Science and social studies has been full of experiments and exploration, as we learn about fossils and characteristics of our environment. It truly is amazing how everything is connected! 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Small Group Instruction: Ms. Alberque

As the students are reading biographies and informational text, they are using K-W-L Charts to help them organize information. The "K" helps them identify what they already know about the topic; the "W" represents what they want to learn about the topic; and the "L" is completed after the reading to demonstrate what they learned about the topic. This method helps to engage the students in their learning and also enables them to monitor their comprehension and learning. We are also continuing with various phonological activities to improve our reading skills. Our writing has focused on grammar and spelling rules, and including more detail in our sentences to make them more interesting. In third and fourth grade math, we are comparing and multiplying fractions. Savvas interactive videos and ixl.com activities are posted in Google Classroom for the math lessons to help your child understand the concepts. Please check your child's planner for their homework and remind your child to read every day.

Small Group Instruction: Mrs. Conversano and Mrs. Marin

In math, fourth grade students have had a lot of practice using area models and partial products to multiply by 1-digit numbers. They are ready to use multiplication skills to divide by 1-digit numbers. Reminder: Nightly homework is 20 minutes IXL skills practice. Students are working on strengthening their response to prompt skills using the RACE toolkit as a reference. Students are encouraged to restate the question, answer the question, cite evidence and explain their evidence. We are also reading every day and writing about the texts in our writing journals. In our grammar lessons, we are working on our capitalization and punctuation skills. The students are also learning various spelling rules that they are using to improve their writing skills. Remember to read every night and check our Google Classroom for IXL practice.

Fourth Grade: Ms. Fenton

Happy April! Fourth grade readers have become experts at identifying the important aspects of a text, including the author's purpose, message, and theme. They are now working on using context clues to determine the meaning of unknown words in a text. There are many strategies to implement, such as looking for synonyms, antonyms, and examples in the text. Authors leave us all kinds of clues, so it is our job as readers to find them! In writing, students have just completed a unit on opinion writing. We learned the importance of providing reasons and evidence to support our opinion. Students explored a variety of fun topics to write about, including our class favorite-tasting jelly beans! Students got to try different jelly bean flavors and write their opinion on this popular candy. We also continue to study etymology and grammar through our Daily Language series. NJSLA testing is coming up in May, so be sure that your child continues to read daily and complete any homework assignments. It is important to get a good night sleep and eat breakfast on the days of testing. More information on testing will be forthcoming. Happy reading!

Fourth Grade: Ms. Mastellone

As we delve deeper into the academic year, I thrilled to share some highlights of what your child has been exploring in fourth grade. In math class, your child is currently immersed in the fascinating world of geometry and angles. They are learning to identify different geometric terms and types of angles. They are mastering the skill of measuring angles by using protractors. Through engaging activities and hands-on experiences, they are gaining a solid understanding of these foundational mathematical concepts. During our science lessons, your child is delving into the captivating world of plants and animals. They are studying both the external and internal structures of various plants and animals, gaining insights into how these structures function and contribute to the organisms' survival. From dissecting flowers to exploring the intricate systems within animals, their curiosity and knowledge is growing. Our social studies curriculum is currently focused on New Jersey's economy. In social studies the students are exploring the ins and outs of New Jersey's economy, focusing on key sectors like transportation services, agriculture, and manufacturing. They're also discovering the importance of manufacturing in creating products and generating jobs. Also, they learned strategies to solve word problems using time intervals. In social studies, our students recently learned about the regions of the world and the regions of our country. They have made mini-books consisting maps and facts they have learned. Please ask your child about any of the continents, and you'll be impressed with their knowledge! A very exciting science news is that our kidney plants have fully reached maturity and are growing new beans! In addition, it has been fascinating to learn about the relationships between the amazing adaptations and survival in organisms. Last but not least, our highlight was hosting guest readers in celebration of the Read Across America and Women's History month in March.
